insects and birds. They also feature historic stone fences and hay barns, reflecting the traditional lifestyle of our ancestors



WITH THE HELP OF THE LIFE IP "FOREST&FARM-LAND" PROJECT, ESTONIAN ENVIRONMENTAL BOARD IS BUILDING A CONSULTATION SERVICE TO:

- find new landowners for managing more areas of semi-natural grassland habitats;
- offer advice to landowners to see and discover the value of their land;
- provide expert guidance and practical support for restoration and management.



Our consultation system combines targeted communication, knowledge sharing, and recognition of people to foster sustainable grassland management:

DIRECT OUTREACH

Monthly emails to 30–50 new potential landowners are sent, followed by personal calls

KNOWLEDGE SHARING

Thematic e-newsletter sent to 6,000+ recipients, 2–3 times a year

FACILITATING COOPERATION

Web-based platform for sharing land rental opportunities between owners and potential lessees is set up

CAPACITY BUILDING

Trainings for landowners and managers to assess the values of their lands is provided

FINANCING GUIDANCE


An overview of available subsidies and procurements opportunities is made clear and understandable

RECOGNITION


Award ceremony to honor most outstanding grassland managers is organised in every second year

LIFE-IP project ForEst&FarmLand (2020-2029) is designed to protect and restore Estonian landscapes and ecosystems and to improve the condition of the species and habitats in Estonian forests and agricultural lands. The project restores 1000 ha of semi-natural habitats, including 20 coastal meadows.
